Strengths and Weaknesses

- What organisational strengths or weaknesses are there in how One Health is approached by your institutions/Una Europa (e.g. is there a strong central team with lots of support?)
- Are there any resource limitations to One Health teaching/research at your institution/Una Europa?
- What strengths do your institution/Una Europa have around One Health in an international context? Are there any gaps which could be strengthened by this partnership?

Opportunities and Challenges

- What opportunities and challenges are there regarding a focus or expansion of One Health activities collectively within this breakout group or the wider Una Europa alliance?
- What collaborations for One Health research and teaching might be possible within this group?
- Is the current pandemic/political environment affecting what One Health opportunities there are in your institution/Una Europa?
